



# Christ Lutheran Church Plans Expansion

Christ Lutheran Church will be embarking on an expansion program that will be comprised of three buildings being constructed over the course of the next several years.

The first structure to take shape will be a 12,000 to 14,000 square foot facility that will house the ROOM211 contemporary worship services and will be located southwest of the main sanctuary with a 5,000 square foot gathering area connecting the two buildings.

Replacement of the temporary school that houses Kindergarten through 5<sup>th</sup> grades will be the second phase of construction. A new, two-story education building will be erected where the northern sanctuary is currently located.

Phase three involves constructing a family life center that will house art and music rooms for the school as well as conference/meeting rooms for the church.

Additionally, Christ Lutheran will be expanding current parking facilities on the west side of 43<sup>rd</sup> street to accommodate the parking requirements required by the city.

Groundbreaking is tentatively scheduled for this fall.
